LEADERSHIP TEAM

School Sisters of Notre Dame elect international leadership team, set future direction

Sixty-five School Sisters of Notre Dame from 34 countries came together Sept. 19-Oct. 24 in Ariccia, Italy, for their 23rd General Chapter to elect a general council and develop a directional statement to guide the way sisters live their mission for the next five years.

The directional statement, "Love Cannot Wait," was the result of a congregation-wide consultation before the General Chapter and intense dialogue and prayerful reflection during the Chapter on the theme, "Called and sent to witness to unity in a divided world."



"I am overjoyed by the results of this chapter. Each chapter member gave herself over to the power and presence of the Holy Spirit working within her. We truly became a community of faith, hope and love, which itself is a witness to unity in a divided world," Sister Mary Maher said. "I believe great good will come from the efforts of all School Sisters and their colleagues when we live out the direction set at this General Chapter."

**Willingness to learn reaps benefits with
one-on-one tutoring for adults**

As an older student, I needed to learn how to learn again – to slow down, focus more and really listen.”

These words of experience come from Eida M. Berrios, a 55-year-old native of Puerto Rico, who has lived and worked as a nurse in Milwaukee for the past 20 years. Because of her job and family, especially her granddaughter, she wanted to improve her verbal and writing skills in English.

Having heard about Milwaukee Achiever Literacy Services from one of her patients, Berrios decided to take the time from her very busy

schedule to be a student, again. She’s been coming to the Scott Street Center for three semesters and studying under the tutelage of Sister Rita Clare Swenarski, SSND.

At Milwaukee Achiever, after an assessment, a personalized plan is prepared and followed for each adult learner. The organization is very strict about students’ attendance. Berrios emphasized that she would recommend the program to others but only if they are willing to make the commitment of time and effort. She conveyed that the benefits are tremendous.

CARING FROM THE HEART

For Berrios, the tutor’s caring from the heart and generous sharing of time is very motivating.

“I appreciate the high expectations and standards that Sister Rita Clare has for me. I respect her and she respects me,” she said.

“I am much happier and more secure because of the support I receive at Milwaukee Achiever. Sister Rita Clare shares a fuller explanation of what I’m learning, which helps me to recognize my errors. She taught me how to slow down and

listen. I feel that I'm making progress with improving my verbal and writing skills."

Berrios values how she's been able to listen more attentively and avoid the tendency to swallow the endings of words.

Sister Rita Clare notes her student's great effort and innovation with finding ways to improve her learning: "Eida recognized how letter sounds are different between English and Spanish, which is a big challenge as she practices verbal skills on her own, at home. Therefore, she came up with the idea of bringing her iPhone to class – recording the correct pronunciation, for reinforcement, after the tutoring session."

AN ENRICHING EXPERIENCE

Berrios has been enriched by the many multicultural learners she meets at Milwaukee Achiever, saying: "I've learned to appreciate many diverse cultures and to realize that though we come from different places, we share similar values as human beings. This new awareness has helped me as a person and in my nursing profession."

She also feels fortunate that at her nursing job, her manager respects different cultures and takes the time

to correct the English of those under her supervision.

Beyond the benefits at work, Berrios' grown daughter and son are very proud of their Mom for going to Milwaukee Achiever. Annabel, her 4-year-old granddaughter, inspires Berrios to want to keep learning the correct pronunciation of words!

THE TUTOR SHARES...

After ministering for 53 years in Catholic education – 21 years as a principal and 32 years as a teacher – Sister Rita Clare Swenarski transitioned from educating youngsters to a new role as a volunteer tutor of adults. She is one of more than 200 dedicated tutors who assist adult learners at

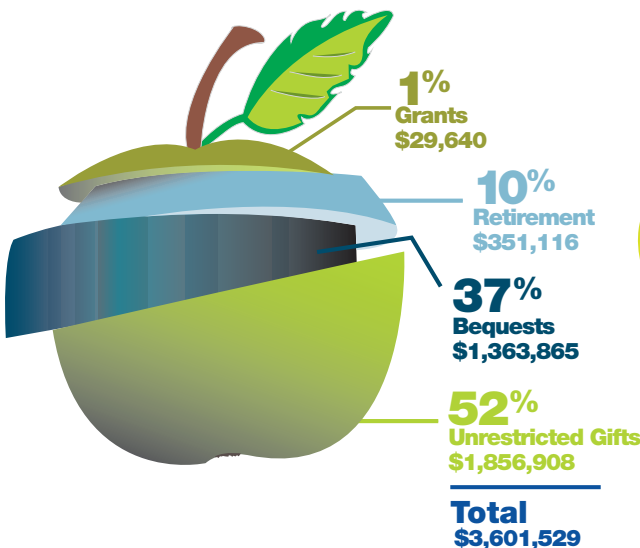

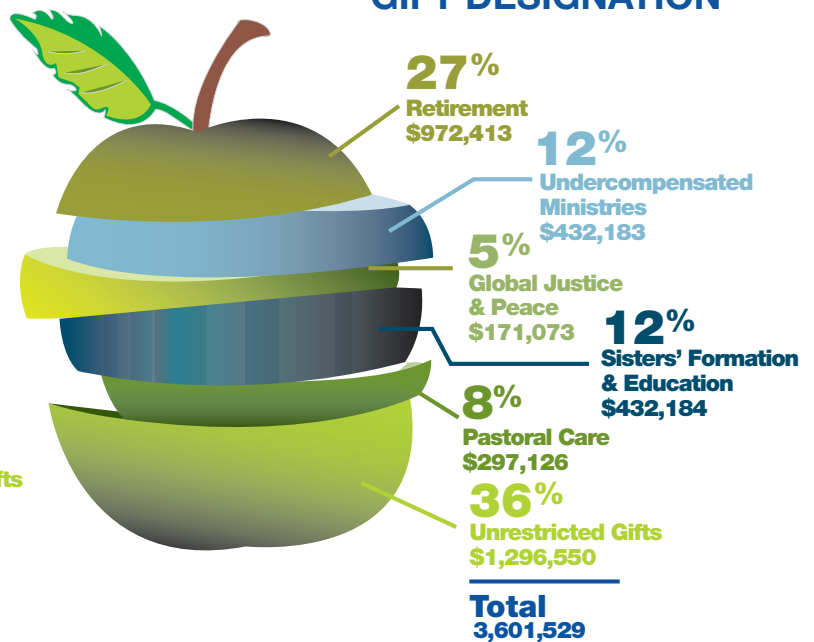
