## Sister M. Rose Sharon Perczynski, SSND

arianne Perczysnki was the eldest of two daughters born to Stanley and Mary (Juchniewicz) Perczynski. She enjoyed happy and eventful years with her parents and sister Bernice in their Grand Rapids, Michigan home.

At the age of six, Marianne began her elementary education at Sacred Heart School in Grand Rapids which was staffed by the School Sisters of Notre Dame. After her First Holy Communion she was more and more attracted to the sisters and the idea of joining the community. At the end of eighth grade, she made her "final" decision, suddenly and to the surprise of all to become a sister. On September 11, 1946, she entered the SSND Juniorate and attended Academy of Our Lady in Chicago, for her first two years of high school. Her entrance, as a candidate was September 5, 1948. She moved to the motherhouse in Milwaukee, where she completed her high school studies. As a novice, she received her religious name, Sister Mary Rose Sharon. She professed first vows on July 30, 1951 and perpetual vows on July 30, 1957. Sister Rose Sharon earned a bachelor's degree from Mount Mary College, Milwaukee, in 1964 and a master's degree in education from Marygrove College, Detroit, in 1971.

As a candidate, she was called to serve as a teacher of primary grades at Sacred Heart in Appleton, Wis. in 1949. Her first assignment as a sister was at St. Nicholas in Freedom, Wis. in1951. She returned to Sacred Heart in 1953 to teach sixth grade and music. As a youngster, Marianne used to follow a classmate home and listen to her practice the piano. When her mother learned this, she insisted that the family get a piano so Marianne could take lessons. Her early love of music helped prepare her for assignments teaching music classes and playing the organ at church. The next years were spent at various missions in Michigan and Indiana. In 1970, she was called to be principal at St. Stanislaus in Michigan City, Ind. and in 1975 was transferred to St. Adalbert in Grand Rapids. In 1979, she served as an 8th grade teacher in Port Washington, Wis. and then as principal at St. John Kanty in Milwaukee. Sister Rose Sharon also served as assistant principal and director of religious education at St. Vincent in Fort Wayne, Ind. Upon leaving school and parish education in 1998, she began a new ministry in pastoral care for nursing homes in Grand Rapids, Mich.

Sister Rose Sharon lived out You Are Sent in her many years of service. This was especially evident in her love of children and commitment to quality education as an administrator.

Because of declining health, she retired in June 2005 and took residence at St. Mary Living Center in Grand Rapids. It was noted by many observers that she ministered to those around her with a sense of humor and a ready smile. She made sure people knew that she was a School Sister of Notre Dame. She even proudly exhibited a doll dressed in the 1963 habit. Her identification as an SSND was important to Sister Sharon Rose because the Dominican Sisters have a motherhouse in Grand Rapids and the Mercy Sisters served there.
