Sister Judith spent the first 12 years of her ministry as a grade school teacher in the Diocese of St. Paul/Minneapolis. She served at Sacred Heart in St. Paul, Immaculate Conception in Lonsdale and St. Bartholomew in Wayzata. Following a year of studies at the College of St. Catherine, she turned to a new ministry visiting the sick and elderly and tutoring adults in Wayzata. Her ministry in adult education continued in Bloomington from 1991 through 2002. For the next eight years, she devoted herself as a spiritual and retreat director, also in Bloomington. Sister Judith then moved to the St. Paul community, where she continued full-time spiritual direction and prayerful witness, the latter of which continues today. She also currently ministers to hospice patients and elderly neighbors. She gives the elderly much needed company while she delivers groceries and medicines to them as needed, providing spiritual direction in the process. Sister Judith holds a bachelor's in elementary education and a minor in theology from Mary Mount College in Milwaukee. In 1991, she earned a master's in theology from the College of St. Catherine.
