Reading: Excerpt from Pope Francis' World Day of Prayer for Peace, Assisi, Sept. 20, 2016

"We have heard the voice of the poor, of children and the younger generations, of women and so many brothers and sisters who are suffering due to war. With them let us say with conviction: No to war! May the anguished cry of the many innocents not go unheeded. Let us urge leaders of nations to defuse the causes of war: the lust for power and money, the greed of arms' dealers, personal interests and vendettas for past wrongs. We need a greater commitment to eradicating the underlying causes of conflicts: poverty, injustice and inequality, the exploitation of and contempt for human life."

<u>Reading</u>: Statement from the USCCB Committee on International Justice and Peace committee on Nuclear Disarmament, Feb. 14, 2020:

(T)he international community recognized the need to move away from the threat of mutual destruction and toward genuine and universal disarmament, as reflected in the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons (NPT). (1968)

Pope Francis has used his visit to Japan (November 2019) to remind the faithful and all actors, states or non-states, of the moral obligation to recommit to the work of ridding the world of nuclear weapons and the threat they pose....

The Committee on International Justice and Peace is grateful to the Holy Father for this renewed effort to bring about a world of peace and justice that is not based on fear or the threat of nuclear annihilation but justice and solidarity.
