At issue is whether the development of nuclear, chemical and biological weapons, and the enormous and growing possibilities offered by new technologies, have granted war an uncontrollable destructive power over great numbers of innocent civilians. The truth is that "never has humanity had such power over itself, yet nothing ensures that it will be used wisely". [241] We can no longer think of war as a solution, because its risks will probably always be greater than its supposed benefits. In view of this, it is very difficult nowadays to invoke the rational criteria elaborated in earlier centuries to speak of the possibility of a "just war". Never again war! [242] Read more... And over time, as codes of law sought to control violence within groups, so did philosophers and clerics and statesmen seek to regulate the destructive power of war. The concept of a "just war" emerged, suggesting that war is justified only when certain conditions were met: if it is waged as a last resort or in self-defense; if the force used is proportional; and if, whenever possible, civilians are spared from violence. The Catholic church's ongoing move away from the just war theory as "settled teaching" to a more expansive call to proactive peacemaking was made clear in a global conference sponsored by the Pontifical Council for Justice and Peace and Pax Christi International. The conference, "Nonviolence and Just Peace: Contributing to the Catholic Understanding of and Commitment to Nonviolence," gathered educators and activists from all over the world with the precise purpose of the conference is to more fully develop a vision of nonviolence and just peace for the Catholic church. Five reasons underlie this pivot to a positive vision of peace and a point of view that goes well beyond the just war theory:

Modern wars have made the just war theory obsolete;

The rise of a Christology "from below";

A clearer understanding of how the New Testament relates to contemporary problems;

A renewed appreciation of the way the early church practiced Jesus' teachings on peace;

The compelling history of nonviolent action over the 60 years since Gandhi.
